I have just repositioned myself several times as I try and sit outside to work on this SPIRE article. It is Friday, March 27th. My children are off from school for a teacher training day and we have spent most of the morning visiting members and friends of Christ Church living in some of the area nursing homes. I love to do this. I am thankful to be able to bring a bit of our vibrant church life into the smaller worlds that some folks inhabit. I enjoy my children getting to share their energy and enthusiasm about life with these folks and for these folks to be able to stand in for a short time as grandparents or great grandparents while ours are so far away. I apologize repeatedly for my kids' rowdiness or because they keep touching things or because in their eagerness to tell some bit of their story they are either loud or interrupting me or each other. Our friends smile and laugh and assure me that it is OK and how glad they are that we all came. When I say that I will be back in several weeks and likely without the kids in tow, my children register their displeasure at the idea of being excluded from this fellowship. There is no doubt in my mind that we are ministering to each other during these sacred visits. Sometimes, before we leave we all join hands and say the Lord's Prayer. This life in Christ is so good.

I am trying to work outside because it is at least 60 degrees. I keep repositioning because the sun is so bright it is blinding me and the glare is too much for the computer screen. But I am not going to give up. I could not feel more alive and grateful and blessed than I do right now. It is a perfect kind of day for inviting you to our Easter celebration on Sunday, April 12th at 10:30. Our worship will include Communion and Bell Choir and Vocal Choir and the good news of God's triumphant "Yes" to life. It is a great moment to be writing to you about the Commencement Party the following Saturday, April 18th. We will share a meal and fellowship and then enjoy the concert in the sanctuary with Jonathan Story. Having undertaken the travel adventure through various religious traditions throughout Lent, we know that the next phase of our Christian journey is commencing.



For the moment I am in denial that the weather patterns of the Northeast make too many days like this one unlikely until sometime in June. I don't want to think about the rain that is in the forecast and how an actual snowstorm can't be ruled out between now and when we can finally put our coats away. My church calendar does make me remember that between now and April 12th, we will all pass through Holy Thursday and Good Friday and those days will be rough ones whatever the weather... and the truth of Easter is worth living for even if it rains on that most glorious day.

## Annee Borthwick

Annee Borthwick's parents gave her the middle name Victoria, since she was born in 1945 between VE and VJ Day. Her father was a British sailor who jumped ship in New York harbor. Her mother had a career as the production editor of a trade journal and earned enough to put her four siblings through college. They lived mainly in Greenwich Village (NYC), had fun during the Great Depression, married late, and had six children. Annee was the fourth.

During the McCarthy anti-radical hysteria of the 1950's, these rationalist, anti-religious parents sent their children to Sunday School at the nearest church (American Baptist, Summit, NJ). "They warned us", Annee says, "not to believe what was taught, but to receive it as social and literary information." Much to the parents' dismay, all six children chose to be baptized. During the summer after high school (1963), Annee spent five weeks in California as part of a four student team organizing youth fellowships and inciting conversion experiences. The crescendo of the first week-long event resulted in Annee claiming her own "born-again in The Spirit" commitment to Christ!



Attending Syracuse University on a full-tuition scholarship, Annee also received a church scholarship which required her to be active within organized Christians and to remain single for the duration of education. Fortunately, the S.U. Campus Christians were active in the civil rights and anti-Vietnam war struggles of 1963--1967. Annee Barr and David Borthwick met on her third day as a freshman, but delayed marriage until a year after Annee completed her B.F.A. [Fine Arts]. They parted 27 years later in 1997.

After two years in Manhattan while David got a theological masters degree, Annee moved to David's home town of Troy in 1969. She has lived here 40 years. Early on, she was a youth fellowship leader at First United Presbyterian Church, where the pastor was her father-in-law George Borthwick (himself the son of missionaries, raised in India). From 1970-73 Annee was part of a feminist consciousness-raising group that included women aged 16 to 46, black and white, from RPI students and Troy's welfare-rights activists. Annee first became friends with Márta Andersen as members of the Thursday Morning Club [now celebrating its 104th year of continuous meeting for study].

Anne and David spent a decade of weekends in Grafton, NY, where they owned 75 acres of forest and built a curious "cabin" from architectural delights discarded during the Troy "urban removal" and major beams and planks from a vast barn they disassembled in Greenwich, NY. They raised two children: Sara, 33, who works for C-net.com in San Francisco; and Matthew, 29, who works as a "top tech guy" for Time Warner in Rotterdam.

After her in-laws moved to Tokyo, Japan in 1977, Annee and her toddlers were twice able to spend months with them, the first time as part of an "around the world in 90 days" promotion by PanAm Airlines. The four have traveled on Canadian and American cross-continental trains, once spent a chilly February week in London because the price was right, and twice spent three weeks touring from Finland to Italy by Eur-Rail Pass. They have also lived in Cambridge, NY.

Annee manages Cherry Hall guesthouse which provides housing for RPI grad students and researchers at her 15 room townhouse built in the Aesthetic style of 1890. The self-described magpie finds it hard to resist second-hand books and finds far too many items to collect. She manages the community garden at Vanderheyden&Fifth, is a charter member of the Pioneer Food Coop, and continues her 40 year involvement in Troy's neighborhood revival. Annee has a keen interest in providing International and American students with an understanding of liberal Christianity.

## Devotional

Big mistake. Lying down on my bed to read my Bible study book, in the late afternoon. Though the book itself (The Last Week by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan) is well written and informative, I felt my eyes drooping. I'd read a paragraph, then fall back to sleep. Which may be why, when I came across this particular phrase, I had to go back and reread the bit before. It was quoting Isaiah 1:11-17 and said, "I desire justice, not worship." Huh? I thought. That is not what it says. It talks about burnt offerings incense and appointed festivals and other Jewish traditions. God was obviously talking to the Jews specifically, because the church today doesn't do those things.

As long as I was able to put this verse in its historic context, it wasn't something I had to deal with. It wasn't speaking to us. But once the word "worship" was put in there, I couldn't deny it was something that does have meaning for the present day church. God is still speaking to us about the importance of justice in our world. While I'm not recommending my method of reading this book, maybe it wasn't such a big mistake after all.

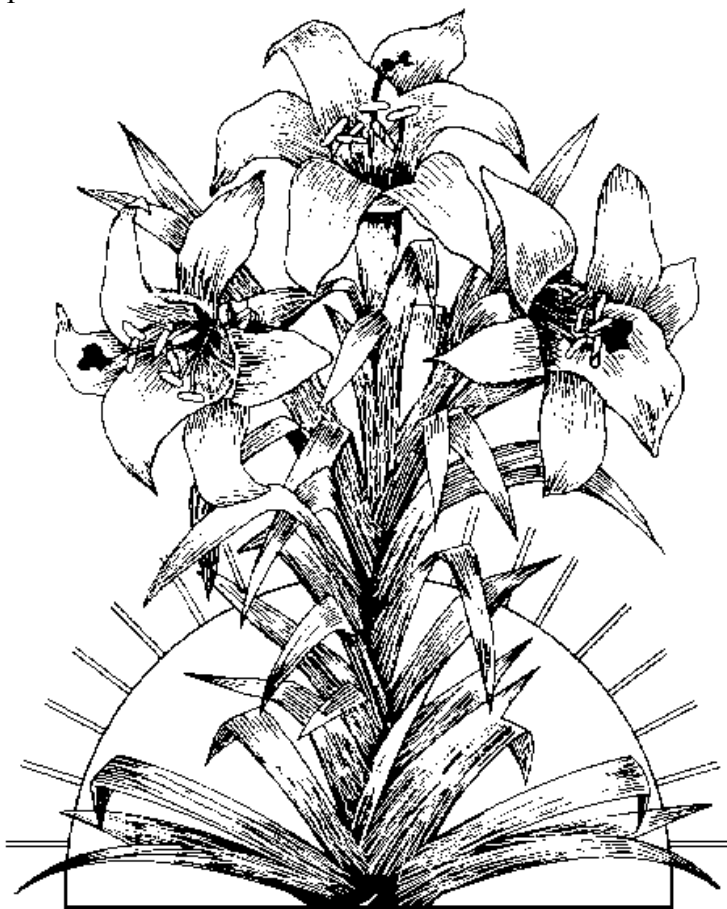
